Since 1991, Sacramento Area Congregations Together (Sacramento ACT) has been the public voice of the progressive faith community. Today, ACT's 56 member congregations and the 60,000 families we represent draw on our shared faith values as we lift up voices that are often silenced in our community: youth, communities of color, immigrants, homeless residents and new voters.

Within ACT, subgroups of congregations work to improve education and safety in our community, increase access to healthcare, end the 'school to prison pipeline' and push for police accountability, eliminate homelessness and support human services, advocate for immigrants and refugees, and engage voters to vote their values.

We work tirelessly to urge the City and County of Sacramento to develop a comprehensive plan to end the crisis of homelessness. Because our region currently has no coordinated roadmap, the system is a navigational nightmare for those who are homeless and those who wish to help. Unconscionably high numbers of people are falling through the cracks. Often our work involves meeting with key elected officials or speaking before the city council or Board of Supervisors.

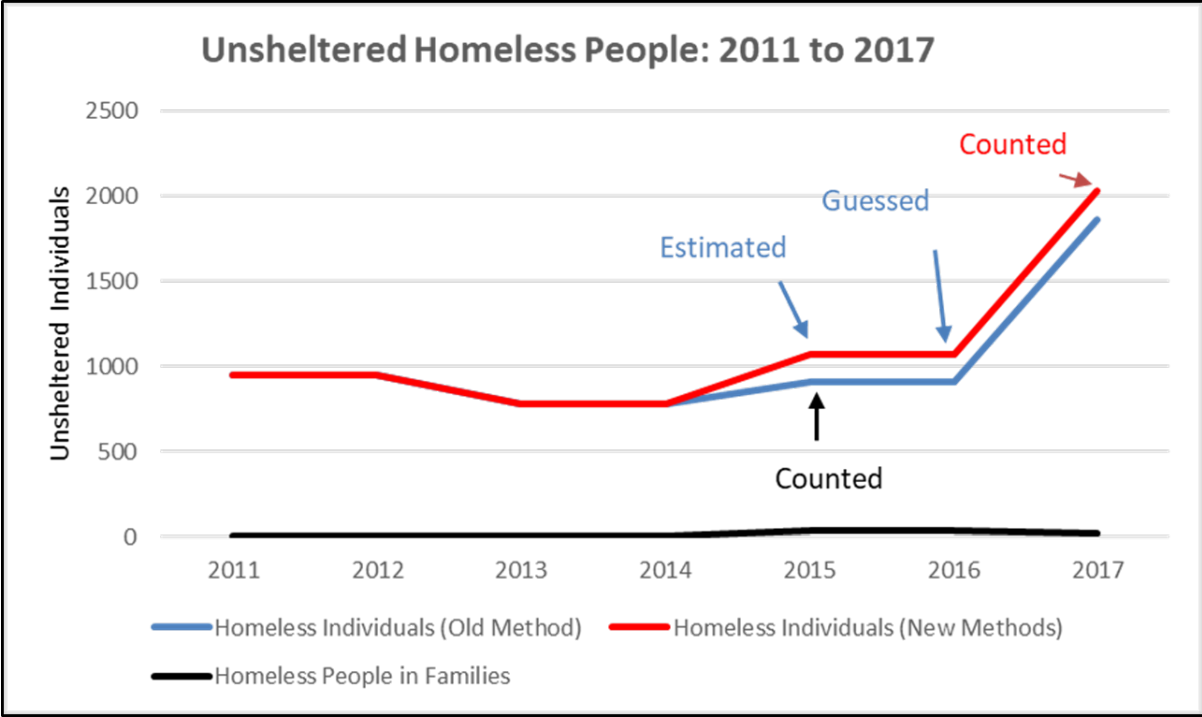

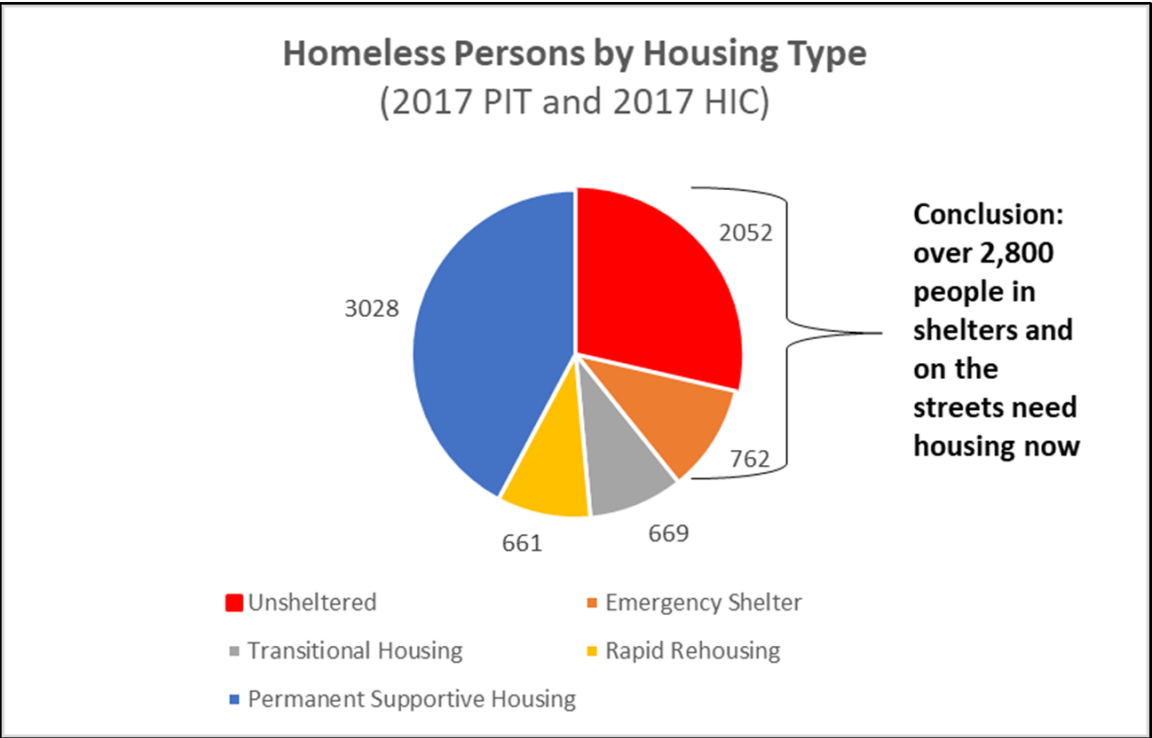
### Types of Housing for Homeless People

| Type                         | Description  |
|------------------------------|--|
| Encampments                  | Informal housing with no sanitary facilities or supportive services created by unsheltered homeless.   |
| Emergency Shelter            | Safe, clean place to stay for persons in need of shelter with a strong focus on immediate placement into housing and linkage to services.  |
| Transitional Housing         | Project-based, time-limited housing with services targeted to homeless adults in recovery.   |
| Rapid rehousing              | Short-term financial assistance to help individuals and families who have fallen into homelessness and assist their rapid return to a permanent housing situation. Subsidies are often limited to 6-12 months. Programs try to tailor that assistance to the needs and abilities of participants to meet their obligations   |
| Permanent Supportive Housing | <p><i>Purpose-built or single-site housing:</i> Apartment buildings designed to primarily serve tenants who are formerly homeless with onsite support services.</p> <p><i>Scattered-site housing:</i> Apartments in private market or general affordable housing apartment buildings released by or on behalf of homeless persons using rental subsidies. Services from visiting staff or in other settings.</p> <p><i>Unit set-asides:</i> Affordable housing owners agree to lease a designated number or set of apartments to tenants who have exited homelessness or who have service needs, and partner with supportive services providers.</p> |

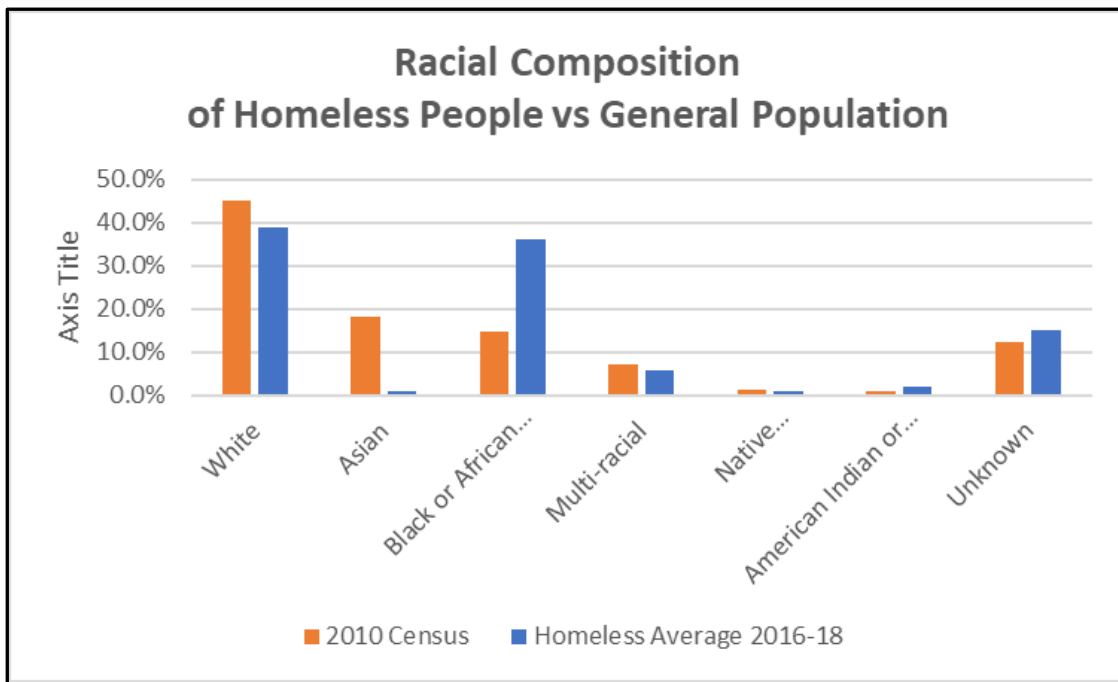

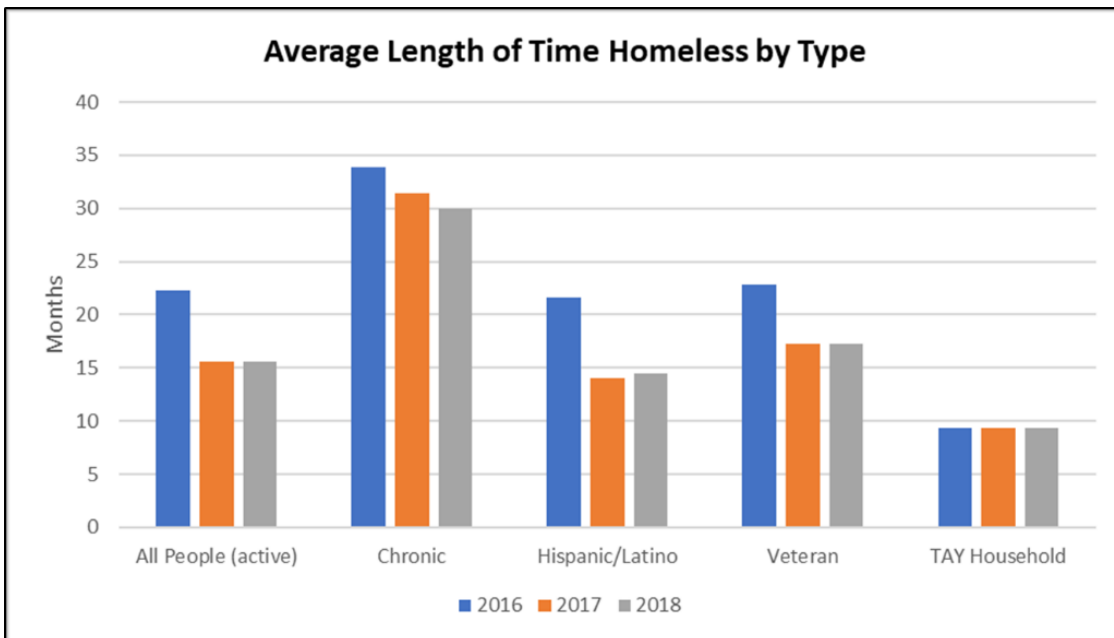

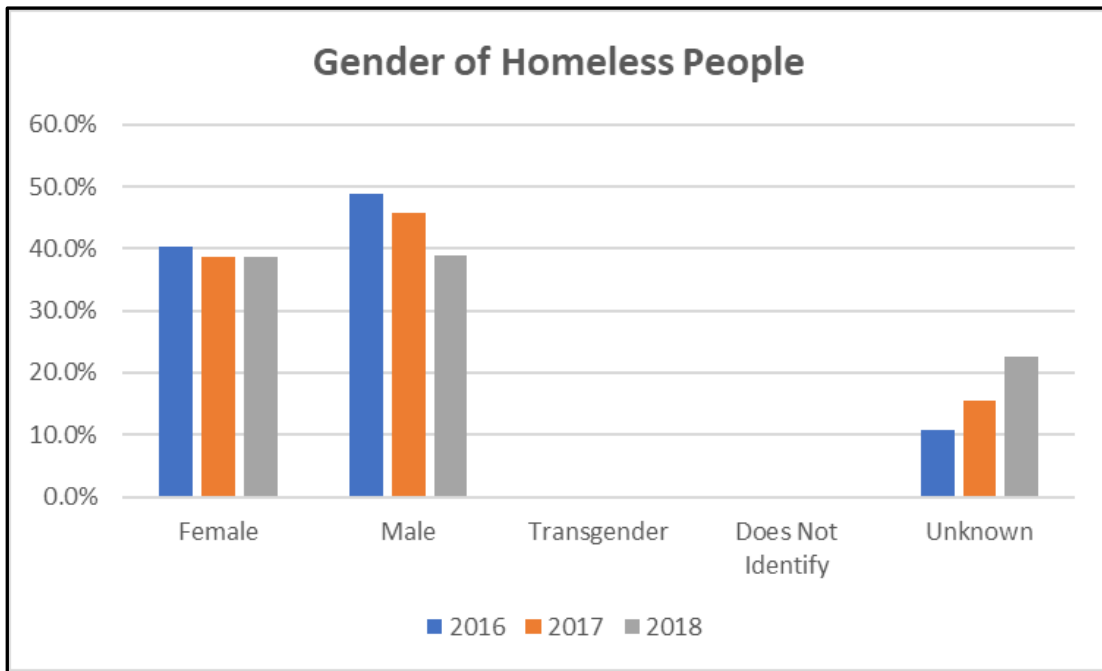

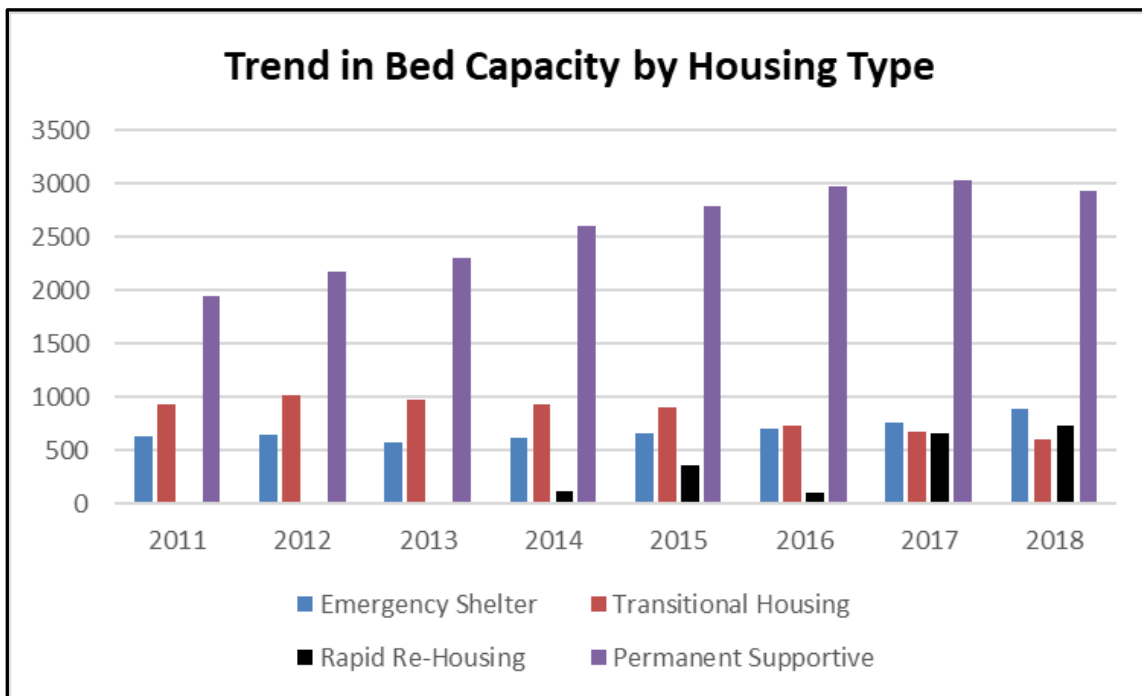

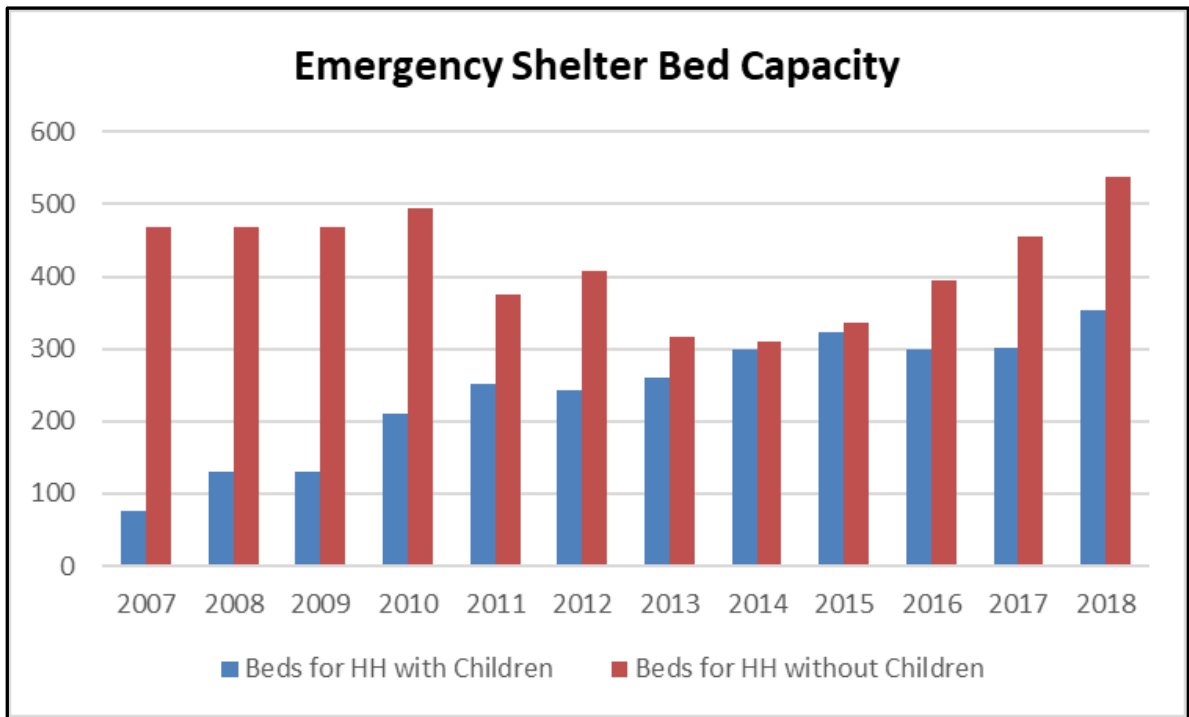

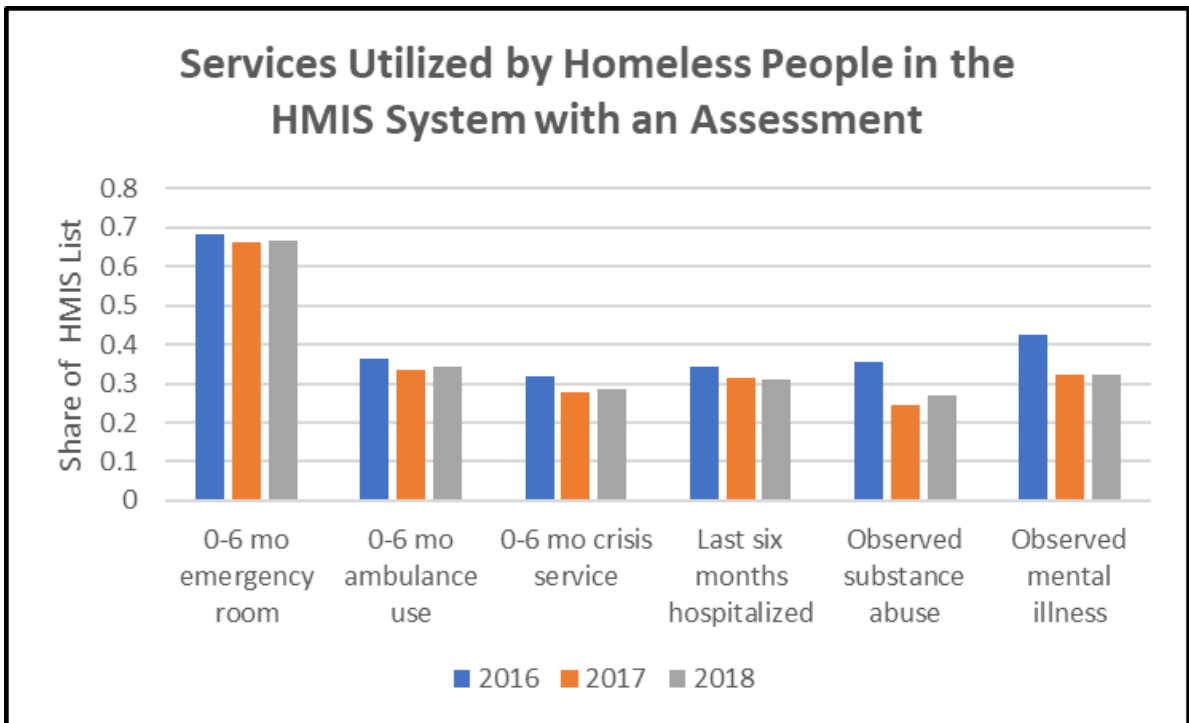

**PRINCIPAL SOURCES OF DATA ABOUT HOMELESS PEOPLE**

| <b>ACRONYM</b>       | <b>SCOPE</b>   | <b>AGENCY</b>  |
|----------------------|--|--|
| PIT                  | <i>Point in Time Count</i><br>Every other odd-numbered year in January SSF counts homeless people, and surveys a sample to obtain detailed demographics.   | SSF obtains consultant help to implement   |
| HIC                  | <i>Housing Inventory Count</i><br>Each year in January SSF collects detailed information about the bed count from each housing operator and submits this to HUD  | SSF collects data from housing operators   |
| HMIS and Master List | <i>Homeless Management Information System</i><br>In compliance with HUD regulations, SSF operates a database which serves as a “master list” of every homeless person with whom service providers are in contact, or have been in contact in the recent past. A subset of this list has been assessed to determine individual service needs. This database has numerous uses to track the progress of people already in various types of housing with supportive services, as well as determine the need for capacity expansion to serve those people still unsheltered. | SSF operates a database of information obtained from navigators, housing and service providers |
